



Active Transportation Legislation

• HB 449, Pedestrian Safety and Facilities Act

- Includes bicyclist safety measures in the pedestrian safety act
- Allows cities and counties to use their B&C motor fuel tax funding for both pedestrian and bicyclist safety
- Allows for bicyclist safety to be considered in addition to pedestrian safety in roadway planning
- HB 235, Eminent Domain Amendments
- HB 65, Active Transportation and Canal Trails
- HB 855, Electric Bike Amendments
- RFA: Active Transportation and Community Planning Assistance (\$250K)



WFRC Role on Capitol Hill

- Technical Expert to aid lawmakers in informed decision-making
- Convener of transportation agencies, partners, and local leaders
- Advocate for appropriations and policies that further the Wasatch Choice Vision and Utah's Unified Transportation Plan





















Beehive Bikeways - Next Steps

Utah Trail Network






UTN Initial Programming Ranked List

The state of Utah is excited to get moving on some trail projects! After meeting with communities across the state in fall of 2023, UDOT and its partners developed a list of <u>4.2 Tier One projects</u> that meet the UTN Guiding Principles, emphasize a transportation benefit, and are feasible for construction soon. These are the projects that will be considered for initial UTN funding. All other projects we heard about at our fall workshops will be considered for future funding!

The UDOT <u>TIF Active</u> prioritization model was used to rank the initial programming project list. This ranked list will be a decision support tool when making project funding recommendations. Additional project context is also considered when making final recommendations.






MAG 2023-2050 RTP Summary







- → AOG/MPO Meetings
- AOG/MPO and local input summarized vetted through guiding principles, and reconciled with Unified Plan
- Coordination with UDOT regions to gather additional project info
- → Projects sorted into Tiers based on local priority and project readiness

Tier Methodology

→ Tier 1 :

- High project readiness (completed or in process design/feasibility work),
- High local priority,
- High transportation value

→ Tier 2 :

- Moderate project readiness,
- Moderate local priority,
- Moderate transportation value,
- Implementation barriers (such as ROW or landowner coordination) may need to be addressed before projects can be advanced

→ Tier 3 :


- Long distance corridors,
- Low transportation value,
- Recreational emphasis



Utah Trail Network Program Timeline





Active Transportation Project Funding

Capacity Project Prioritization

The Utah Transportation Commission, in consultation with the Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) and the state's Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs), developed a written prioritization process to guide the decision-making process for programming Transportation Investment Fund (TIF) and Transit Transportation Investment Fund (TTIF) monies for transportation capacity projects. This site houses everything about the TIF/TTIF prioritization process, including the modeling process, information on nominations, the legislative requirements, and frequently asked questions.





What is the TIF and TTIF?

According to the <u>UDOT Strategic Direction</u> the TIF and TTIF account for roughly 50% of total UDOT funding. The funding is used to construct capacity projects in addition to bond payments and other transportation infrastructure.



Transportation Improvement Program Applications

Federal funding sources programmed by Metropolitan Planning Organizations:



Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Program

Provides funding for transportation projects that improve air quality.



Surface Transportation Program

Provides funding for highways and bridges, transit capital improvements and projects, and active transportation projects.



Transportation Alternatives Program

Provides funding for the planning and construction of bicycle and pedestrian facilities.



Carbon Reduction Program

Provides funding for transportation projects that reduce on-road carbon dioxide emissions.
