The American Fork Station Area Plan was adopted in May 2014 by the City Council. The purpose of the project was to develop a plan that the City can use to guide development toward being transit supportive; utilizing elements of vertical and horizontal mixed use, smaller scale commercial and office park areas. Currently, the City is also pursuing the creation and adoption of a form-based code to implement the plan. The City envisions this area as a place that people will come to live and work. The final product will be a form based code that will guide development, focused more on form than land use, and to achieve the desired result of a true transit oriented development station area.

Mayor James Hadfield

Mayor James H. (J.H.) Hadfield is a longtime resident of American Fork, Utah. He is a veteran of military service with over 30 years. Mayor Hadfield retired as a Colonel in the Utah National Guard.
