Key Legislation



Priority Transportation Bills

- SB 185, Transportation Amendments (Harper): provides a long-term stable source of funding for the Utah Trail Network with a transfer of 5% of the TIF (\$45M ongoing). The bill also allows for local distribution of road usage charge revenues.
- SB 260, Transportation Funding Requirements (Cullimore) modifies the .20% local option transportation sales tax, also known as the "5th 5th" by extending the imposition deadline, and allowing counties who impose the tax to divide revenues between the county, city, and transit providers.
- HB 301, Transportation Tax Amendments (Schultz): provides temporary gas tax relief by initially (\$55M cut) decreasing the tax rate and allowing for more gradual growth in the rate over time, establishes a 12.5% tax on the retail sale of electric vehicle charging energy, and increases vehicle registration fees \$7.
- SB 84, Housing and Transit Reinvestment Zone Amendments (Harper): amends HTRZ proposal requirements by clarifying the allowable number of HTRZs, eligible stations, and objectives that must be met. It also makes changes to the HTRZ committee and their actions.
- SB 27, Transportation Revisions (Harper): Makes clarifying changes to the Station Area Planning (SAP) statute, decreases the TTIF match rate from 40% to 30%, and makes a number of other changes to UDOT code.



Other Priority Transportation Bills

- SB175, Rural Transportation Infrastructure Fund (Owens): creates and funds the Rural Transportation Investment Fund (RTIF) which provides transportation funding for 3rd-6th class counties, distributed like B&C road funds.
- SB125, Transportation Infrastructure Amendments (Wilson): designates
 the ASPIRE Engineering Research Center at Utah State University as the
 research center for strategic planning and electrification for transportation
 infrastructure in the state.
- HB44, Corridor Preservation Amendments (Christofferson): allows UDOT to preserve corridors 40 years ahead of the need, as opposed to the current 30 year purchasing outlook allowed, and provides that UDOT can utilize corridor preservation funds to be used for administrative costs of the fund.



Federal Grants



Grant Award: Safe Streets and Roads For All

- WFRC Awarded \$775,000
- Funding to create a regional "Safety Action Plan"
- Safety Action plan will include:
 - O Identification of risk factors and safety strategies
 - Capital projects to improve safety
- Cities & counties can apply for additional SS4A funding to fund capital projects in 2024



RAISE Grant: First-/Last-Mile Transit Connections

- \$25M requested (total \$31.25M)
- 15 Projects in MAG + WFRC area
- Bike lanes, multi-use trail connections, intersection improvements, etc.
- Goal: to provide greater connectivity to transit by improving first-/last-mile connections
- Awards will be announced end of June
- Projects would be constructed 2026 2028


