# 1. Introductions and Consent Agenda [00:02:00]

Mayor Dawn Ramsey called the meeting to order at 9:53 a.m. Introductions were made, via roll call. a. ACTION: Approve Minutes from March 19, 2020 [00:05:02]

Noting no discussion or changes, Mayor Ramsey entertained a motion to accept the minutes. Councilmember Amiee Winder-Newton made a motion to accept, which was seconded by Councilmember Tina Cannon. The affirmative vote was unanimous.

#### 2. Chair Report [00:06:18]

Mayor Ramsey stated that she is glad to be part of a community, Utah as a whole, that is willing to work together as we eventually emerge from the pandemic and recover from the economic effects.

#### 3. Public Comment [00:07:40]

Mayor Ramsey opened the meeting for public comments. There were none.

4. ACTION: Amendment 1 to the 2019-2050 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) [00:8:35] Jory Johner, WFRC, presented a proposed Amendment to the Regional Transportation Plan and asked that the RGC formally adopt these modifications. Amendment 1 includes a total of seven Level 2 (board modifications of non-regionally significant project) requests, one each from Farmington, Layton, Salt Lake County, and UDOT, and three from West Jordan, as well as two additional Level 1 (staff modification) requests from Farr West and Millcreek. Mr. Johner briefly discussed each project. [00:28:46] The meeting was opened for Public Comment specific to this 2019-2050 RTP Amendment. There were no Public Comments and the period was closed. [00:30:00] Commissioner Jeff Scott made a motion to approve Amendment 1 as outlined. Carlton Christensen, UTA Board Trustee, seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved.

#### 5. COVID19 impacts on transportation and communities [0:31:00]

#### a. Short-term data on impacts of "Stay Home Phase"

Ted Knowlton, WFRC, outlined data on current COVID19 shifts in behavior and impacts on transportation and air quality.

#### b. Long-term risks and opportunities in recovery

Mr. Knowlton then opened the time up for a discussion about the long-term shifts we may see in communities after the COVID19 pandemic subsides. Residents and businesses are trying new ways of conducting business, reaching customers, and even spending their free time. WFRC is committed to helping communities navigate these long-term changes, hoping to help shape them to maximize benefits and minimize negative impacts.

#### c. Addressing resiliency within the Wasatch Choice Regional Vision

Mr. Knowlton concluded by leading a discussion of policy approaches appropriate for the recovery. Communities will be thinking through the implications on community development to inform effective development of general plans. With the disruption of "business as usual" we are currently experiencing, this is also a time to reflect on what kind of communities we want to develop and be poised for long-term recovery and enhanced community resilience.

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#### 6. Other Business [01:21:48]

After asking if there were other business items to address and hearing none, Mayor Ramsey reminded the group that the next RGC meeting is scheduled for August 20, 2020. The meeting format may be similar to this, if the safety guidelines regarding COVID-19 are still in place at that time. More information will be disseminated via email closer to the meeting date.

#### 7. Adjournment [01:25:44]

Mayor Ramsey requested a motion of adjournment. Reid Ewing, University of Utah, made a motion to adjourn the meeting. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Jeff Scott and accepted unanimously. The meeting concluded at 10:32am.

## **BACKGROUND:**

During the Wasatch Choice Implementation Workshop series in the winter of 2019, WFRC's Council and RGC asked staff to develop resources to assist local governments with conversations about planning for growth. In addition to our ongoing growth challenges, we now have the added impacts from the coronavirus, and the potential short and long-term changes to how our residents live, work, play, and travel within communities and the region.

To respond to these challenges staff developed a document outlining Partnership efforts in Utah to address the local planning challenges of growth and recovery within the Wasatch Choice Regional Vision. The Wasatch Choice Partners – including WFRC, MAG, UDOT, UTA, ULCT, UAC, Salt Lake Chamber and other local chambers, APA Utah, GOMB, and local government representatives – developed four working groups to implement this partnership effort. This collaborative effort seeks to provide resources for local governments to address statutory requirements in their General Plans from <u>SB34</u> (2019, housing, transportation and land use), and link local planning to the regional vision. The four working groups are: Communications, Public Engagement, Technical Assistance, and Analysis. Each group has held two meetings, and have developed core objectives to focus on over the next six months. Resources developed by the working groups will be presented at the upcoming Utah League of Cities and Towns (ULCT) conference in September 2020.

Staff is asking RGC to provide feedback on these resources such that they will be helpful for your local government or organization.

## **BACKGROUND:**

WFRC is beginning the 2023-2050 Wasatch Choice Vision Update with a focus on exploring COVID-19 and other external forces (like market shifts, transportation technologies) that would impact the region's transportation, land use, and economic development. The Wasatch Choice vision coordinates regional and local planning. The intent of exploring external forces is to 1) consider modifications to the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) process to improve the resiliency and quality of projected outcomes, and 2) have a conversation with local governments about proactive local strategies.

To date, WFRC, working with transportation partners and local planners, has gathered initial research and literature on external forces and policies including:

- shifts in lifestyle stemming from COVID-19
- automation
- shared mobility
- e-living

A document is included as an exhibit that summarizes this research, as well as potential policies that could be explored regionally and locally.

At the RGC meeting, we will look for input on the approach to addressing these external forces in the 2023-2050 RTP, and considerations for local governments that will be further explored in events this fall.

The Wasatch Front Regional Council administers six programs that provide resources for local governments, totaling approximately \$40 million annually. These programs include:

- Surface Transportation Program (STP)
- Congestion Mitigation Air Quality (CMAQ)
- Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP)
- Transportation and Land Use Connection (TLC)
- Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)
- Wasatch Front Economic Development District (WFEDD)

A presentation will be given briefly describing these programs, to increase awareness of funding and resource opportunities, as well as to encourage efficiency and coordination among the programs for applicants.
