<p>Welcome and Introductions – Ryan Perry Salt Lake County Director of Regional Planning and Transportation</p>	<p>Ryan Perry, Salt Lake County Planning Director, introduced the meeting and welcomed the attendees. PlanTAC was held via Zoom.</p>	<p>None Required</p>
<p>1. Meeting Summary – December 16, 2020 Minutes</p>	<p>Ryan Perry, Salt Lake County Director of Regional Planning and Transportation, called for a motion to approve the December 16, 2020 minutes.</p>	<p>Approved</p>
<p>2. Legislative Update – Angela Price and Wilf Sommerkorn, APA Utah</p>	<p>Angela Price and Wilf Sommerkorn with APA-Utah provided a legislative update and shared some highlights of bills that may impact transportation and land use.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● HB-82 Focused on Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs). In areas with permitted ADUs, legislation would make it so that the use of internal ADU is a permitted use; and may not establish restrictions/requirements for construction/use of an internal ADU, including a restriction or requirements governing: Bill has become a number one priority because there have been lots of discussions on housing affordability. ● HB-98 Local Government Building Regulation Amendments, would allow applicants to opt out of an inspection and engage their own licensed building inspector. ● HB-211 Bill would not allow cities to regulate design standards. This bill would be limited to single family homes, duplexes, and triplexes and require cities to have a 14 day review window. <p>3. Implementation Jake Young, Salt Lake County Planning Program Manager</p>	<p>Jake Young, Salt Lake County Planning Program Manager, led a discussion on how staff and elected officials can work more effectively together. Jake shared a survey that is planned to go out through the American Planning Association – Utah and meant to be anonymous for answering. He provided a copy of the proposed questions with some additional comments provided from the PlanTAC meeting earlier in the day.</p> <p>Comments: Find out how much the general plan is used and referred by staff, planning commission, council? In our community, we spend a few minutes at each meeting to learn one new aspect about planning during planning commission. City Council members in one community are required to have experience on the Planning Commission, this helps address the disconnect between the planning commission and Council. In another community, a Council member joins planning commission members and is required to report ongoing activities during council meetings.</p> <p>The feedback from the discussions will be used and incorporated in the survey that will be sent out.</p> <p>To provide more comments or information, please contact Jake Young at JAYoung@slco.org.</p>	<p>None Required</p>
<p>3. Wasatch Choice Map Refinement and Growth Forecast Adjustments Bert Granberg, WFRC Analytics Director</p>	<p>Bert Granberg, WFRC Analytics Director, provided an overview of the Travel Demand Model and how the model is key in developing the Regional Transportation Plan as well as many other pieces that WFRC works on. WFRC just developed a generalized future land use layer which is available on the Wasatch Choice Interactive map. There is also a new addition of a gear button to allow customization for data available on the WC Vision. The WFRC analytics team is currently conducting a centers refinement, with the goal of making Wasatch Choice centers more in alignment with existing centers identified in local general plans. Bert highlighted a few refinements already conducted in the Layton area. Once a first cut of these center refinements are conducted, they will be shared with the cities to provide comments and additional input. In addition to having better reflection of local general and land use plans on the Wasatch Choice map, the purpose of this exercise is to create a “living” map” and also make sure that the centers are in alignment with the Real Estate Market Model (REMM) developed.</p> <p>The WFRC analytics team is trying to track the best point of contact for the different communities in the region.</p> <p>Please contact Bert Granberg at bgranberg@wfr.org for additional information and if you would like to be the point of contact for your community.</p>	<p>None Required</p>
<p>5. UTA's Draft Five-Year Service Plan</p>	<p>Alex Beim, Strategic Planner at the Utah Transit Authority provided an update to UTA's Draft Five-Year Service Plan. The Five-Year Service Plan reflects UTA's intended service based on the best information available and built on WFRC and MAG's regional transportation plans.</p>	<p>None Required</p>

<p>6. Local Plans/RTP Coordination Nikki Navio, Transportation Planner, WFRC</p>	<p>Nikki Navio, Transportation Planner at WFRC reminded the group that WFRC is collecting information on ongoing and recent efforts led at the local level to be shared with the Long Range Planning group WFRC. She provided the group a list of existing and ongoing studies that are happening in the region then asked everyone if there are additional studies that are missing. Any additional studies collected will be compiled and analyzed to determine which projects should be captured on the 2023-2050 Regional Transportation Plan with the input of local communities.</p> <p>Please contact Nikki Navio at nikki@wfrfc.org to coordinate local transportation plans with the RTP.</p>	<p>None Required</p>
<p>7. Regional Study Updates Julie Bjornstad, Transportation Planner, WFRC</p>	<p>Julie Bjornstad, Senior Transportation Planner at WFRC, provided a quick update on two ongoing studies: Utah Parking Modernization, and Road and Transit Cost Study.</p> <p>For the Utah Parking Modernization Study, the purpose was to gain understanding on how parking was for each land use type, parking utilization data and what parking ordinance recommendations exist. There were also recommendations on right-sizing parking, as well as managing travel behavior and supporting policies, on data collection, and on performance metrics. A second phase of the study will focus on regional implementation of these recommendations, like model codes, how to redesign and reuse existing parking, and communication for affecting change. Draft documents for the study are being reviewed right now and will be shared soon.</p> <p>The main purpose of the Road and Transit Cost Study is to really try to understand the level of investment and funding sources for Utah's transportation infrastructure on a per user/per capacity basis. Data will be collected and help provide clarification about how public investment, user fees, private investments, and personal investments fund the construction, maintenance, and operations of Utah's roadway and transit systems.
