- Explore creating sub-committees focused on specific topic areas (communications, civic engagement, etc)





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






Our Region is Growing


Our region is growing rapidly, which brings both challenges and opportunities.

UTA is developing a Long Range Transit Plan for the next 30 years focused on understanding and responding to the future needs of the communities we serve


Establish Strategies for Implementation

The LRTP will not focus on short-term changes to routes or service, but rather a future network to grow our livable communities!



UTA Planning Process

- The UTA Long Range Transit Plan (LRTP) will present a comprehensive vision for public transit. It builds on projects developed in partnership with regional partners.
- UTA's Five-Year Service Plan focuses on short-term service improvements.
- The **Operational Planning** process refines and finalizes annual service changes, which are then **Implemented on Change Day**.

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

UTA's Ridership Growth Exceeds the National Average

- Commuter based services (Express bus and FrontRunner) are recovering the slowest
 - A sign that rider behavior is changing
- Fixed-route bus and light rail service is more resilient



Mode	UTA Recovery	National Average*
Bus	75%	66%
Rail	75%	60%

UTA Service	UTA Recovery	
Express Bus	35%	
Commuter Rail	66%	
Bus - Regular	76%	
Light Rail	77%	
Streetcar	149%

Defining Success: How have other Long Range Transit Plans Shaped a Region?



- Examined five agencies from across the US and Canada that recently completed a long-range transit plan
- Identified the innovative approaches that UTA can utilize for engagement, identifying needs, prioritizing capital investments

How well does UTA serve the region today?

- Demographic / Travel Data
 - Transit propensity (likelihood of using transit)
 - Demographics
 - Transit supply versus propensity (Gaps Analysis)
 - Are there areas that would greatly benefit from and use transit, but don't have transit service to meet that need?
- Overview of Existing Ridership
 - Ridership in Fall 2022
 - Ridership change between 2019-2022




How well does UTA serve the future travel market?

- Population/employment projections and future anticipated travel flows
 - Data from regional planning agencies (i.e., WFRC and MAG)
- Future gaps analysis
 - Where will people live, work, and travel in the future relative to the current transit network (as well as current planned projects)?



The LRTP will consider the needs of those who rely most on transit

• Mobility needs of low-income populations will be highlighted



Transit Accessibility with Current Network

- Currently, nearly 1 million people live within ¼-mile walking distance of any UTA service and over 235,000 people live within ½ mile of rail or high-frequency bus rapid transit service
- In 2050, there would be 32% more people within ¼-mile of any UTA service and 81% more within ½ mile of rail or high frequency service*

	2020	Growth, 2020-2050
Residents within 1/4 mile Walk of any UTA Service	999,500 (41% of service area population)	+32%
Jobs within ¼ mile Walk of any UTA Service	639,300 (43% of jobs in service area)	+65%
Residents within ½ mile walk of rail or high frequency service	235,200 (10% of service area population)	+81%
Jobs within ½ mile walk of rail or high frequency service	288,400 (19% of jobs in service area)	+70%



- UTA's Long-Range Transit Plan 2023-2050 to be completed in the fall of 2023
- Goals of the LRTP Project Team
 - Create a plan that comes from UTA service area communities, identifies the existing and anticipated travel needs for the region, and prioritizes those projects
 - Design the LRTP development process to be replicable for UTA staff and comprehensible to the public
- Process is concurrent with the Five-Year Service Plan
